





In 1962, a National Institutes of Health Study cited the urgent need for research in human reproduction.

In 1963, the National Academy of Sciences stated:
"Science and technology must provide knowledge of the nature of reproductive processes and simple, acceptable techniques for controlling them," and recommended:





The first scientific investigation, and organized body of data, on the comparative value of various contraceptive techniques and products in use was made at the Bureau.

Pioneer studies of M.E.Kopp, Hannah Stone, J.F. Cooper, R.K.Stix, F.Notestein, R.L.Dickinson and many others, in the fields of conception control, marriage and family living were based on Bureau records.

Today, vital clinical and laboratory research is in progress on the effects of various substances on human sperm cells; on new compounds for treatment of infertility problems and on spermicidal and clinical effectiveness of various new and old contraceptives.

Is the contraceptive on the druggist's shelf safe, effective?

In 1956, the Fertility Research Laboratory—the only independent testing center in the U.S. for the evaluation of contraceptive products—was established at the Sanger Bureau to answer that question.

In 1960, The Fertility Research Laboratory became the official testing center for the Planned Parenthood Federation of America. To date, over 150 commercial and research products have been studied in this Laboratory for their spermicidal value, and the data made available to medical bodies and planned parent-

hood centers everywhere. In addition, vital research on sperm physiology is carried on here.

The Bureau participates in many national and international conferences. Recently, it presented a paper on the "First 500 Salpingograms Taken at the Bureau," at an International Fertility Congress in Amsterdam, Holland; mounted a unique exhibition on Spermicidal Testing Methods and Procedures, shown at medical conferences in the United States, and is currently preparing for publication six scientific papers in various aspects of human fertility, based on Bureau research.

Dear Mr. Holmes:

This letter goes out to a group of old friends of Margaret Sanger in the great hope of giving evidence to her of the affection in which she is held by hundreds of her friends. These friends in turn represent millions of women throughout the world who venerate the name of Margaret Sanger.

There is only one place in the world that has the honor of bearing the name of Margaret Sanger and that has the possibility of perpetuating that name to future generations. It is a small four story building at 17 West 16th Street in New York City which houses the Margaret Sanger Research Bureau. This building was the setting of the first permanent birth control center in the United States, started by Margaret Sanger herself in 1923.

What began in a modest way on the parlor floor in her own house, has grown up to the attic and down to the basement, and is now a splendid international demonstration center for family planning. Here, thousands of women receive contraceptive advice every year; hundreds of men and women come from all corners of the earth for training and guidance in population control; and vital laboratory and clinical research in human reproduction is carried forward.

Earlier this year, the owners of the building notified the Bureau that the building must be sold in order to settle an estate. After much thought, the Board of the Margaret Sanger Research Bureau decided to purchase the building to assure continuation of this vital work. In order to accomplish this, it was necessary to borrow a large sum of money. In addition, the building is urgently in need of electrical and plumbing repairs, painting and general renovation—all of which have

What is. The Margaret Sanger Research Bureau?

Founded by Margaret Sanger in 1923, the Bureau is an internationally renowned center for service, education and research in family planning and human fertility.

> What Does the Bureau Do?

Prescription of Birth Control Methods

Experienced doctors prescribe safe, reliable birth control methods, including the oral and injectable ovulation suppressants, and intra-uterine devices, as well as the "rhythm" method. New patients receive a medical examination; with the doctor, choose the method best suited to their needs; and are taught how to use it.

Diagnostic Service — Individual consultation, examination and tests are available for women concerned about a delayed menstrual period. Through early diagnoses, needless anxieties are often prevented.

Papanicolaou Tests for detection of cervical cancer are provided for patients on request.

Referrals — When in the course of examination, pathological conditions are noted, appropriate medical referrals are made.

Semen Analysis is offered to husbands of newly married couples. Early detection of pathology may eliminate later difficulties in conception.

Safe Period Service. After an initial consultation with the doctor, the monthly menstrual history chart is evaluated by mail to determine the fertile and infertile ("safe") days.
